Cotton Wool Rainbow

Arrange circular cotton wool pads in a rainbow shape.
Use food colouring to make/mix your colours (add water) and pour each colour onto the cotton pads. It absorbs and blends beautifully. Once dry, arrange again and stick onto a piece of paper.

Chalk Rainbow

Use chalk to draw a rainbow on the ground in your garden or on the pavement. You could leave a space between each colour and see how far you can jump over it. What colour do you land on? Remember to take a great photo!

Painted Rainbow

Paint or colour a rainbow as bright as can be!

Paint a palm rainbow!

Paint the palm of your hand and print it onto a piece of paper over and over in an arc shape. Change colour and print again until you have made a rainbow.

Walking water experiment

Line up 7 clear glasses. Fill each glass half full with water. In the first and last glass add red food colouring. To the third glass, add yellow. Add blue to the fifth. Use folded kitchen roll between each glass so each end dangles in two glasses next to each other. Watch your rainbow grow and take a fabulous photo!

Rainbow Cake

Bake a rainbow cake of coloured layers of sponge. Yum!

Lego Rainbow

Can you make a rainbow from Lego? Take a lovely photo!

Salt Rainbow

Pour salt in curved lines until you have a rainbow. Use watercolours and a paintbrush to paint the salt!

Rainbow Collage

Create a rainbow collage by gluing down bits of coloured paper, sweet wrappers, scraps of material, milk bottle tops, buttons. The more variety the better.
